

Exploring the Interface between Psychotherapy & Spirituality

10-week class

PROGRAM

Many psychotherapists become uncomfortable when spiritual/religious issues surface in therapy, while many spiritual directors are similarly uncomfortable when psychological issues come to the fore. Class participants will be invited to explore the contributions psychotherapy and spirituality offer to those with whom we work, as well as our particular understandings and resistances to each. Topics we will explore together include:

- the difference between religion & spirituality
- spiritual assessment
- psychological & spiritual perspectives on the life journey
- defining & recognizing the sacred
- the process of healing & personal transformation
- the role of listening, witnessing & discernment
- the vital role of connection & community

Teaching methods will include lectures, class discussion, video presentations and small group processing focused around case vignettes. As a result of our discussions together, it is hoped that we each will have an increased appreciation for the psychological and spiritual dimensions of human experience, and be more comfortable walking the threshold between them.
