Royce White to headline conference addressing stigma around help-seeking for men and boys

June 18, 2019, Des Moines, IA – Royce White, former NBA player and Iowa State University basketball star, will headline a conference addressing stigma around help-seeking for men and boys. Research shows that men and boys are less likely to visit a health care provider and more likely to complete suicide or harm others as a result of depression, anxiety and other issues related to mental health. This conference will explore reasons why, and how the community can make positive change. The conference is co-sponsored by the Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center (the Center) and Des Moines University (DMU). It will take place at DMU on July 11-12, 2019.

"Royce White has been a dynamic and effective advocate for mental health and we are pleased to welcome him to Des Moines to help us launch this event," said Jim Hayes, D.Min, M.Div., the Center's executive director. "Our conference is unique because it will bring inspiration to the whole community – as well as evidence-based, pragmatic applications for primary health care providers and therapists."

At the core of the conference will be findings presented by two researchers from the psychology department at Iowa State University, David Vogel, Ph.D., and Patrick Health, M.S. Also, breakout sessions will help participants explore topics such as the impact of post-partum depression on men and an examination of male psychology through superhero representations.

The mental health needs of men and boys can go unrecognized and untreated, and this is an important effort to emphasize the importance of seeking help for these concerns," said Dr. Lisa Streyffeler, Ph.D., DMU assistant professor and chair, department of behavioral medicine, medical humanities and bioethics.

Dr. Streyfeller emphasized that managing mental health is just as important and effective as seeking help for pneumonia or a broken leg.
